2) List at least twice a week during the holiday.

3) Use [languagesonline.org.uk](http://www.languagesonline.org.uk) to revise all the verb tenses over the holiday.

4) Watch the films 'Goodbye Lenin' and 'das Leben der Anderen' with subtitles. You will be able to study one of these as part of your A level course and the choice will be yours (collectively).
