Attendees heard an informative presentation from Fiona Francombe (The Bottle Yard Studios) about her own and typical experiences of working within this sector as well as some helpful hints for getting in to the industry. A variety of local employers & organisations from the creative sector were also present including Creative Youth Network, Icon Films, Knowle West Media Centre amongst others.



During the presentation, and as a result of informal conversations between students and employers, a wide variety of information was shared allowing BCCS students an excellent opportunity to find out about job roles, skills & qualities needed within this sector— one or two entrepreneurial students, using newly acquired networking skills, even managed to secure work experience placements!

Enterprise Challenges

Across the past term Year 12 and 13 students have had the opportunity to take part in two external Enterprise Challenges.

The first, The Business Retail Challenge, organised by Henley Business School, and delivered across three live webinars, required students to investigate the business Tesco. During the live webinars students were provided background information, current news stories as well as share prices and then set a task of devising a new strategy for Tesco's future direction.
