1) The most important thing that students can do is ensure that the grammar, especially verb tenses, that they have been taught is SECURE. Either a) work through pages 1-25 of the attached grammar booklet. or b) choose your grammar website:

2) Vocabulary is obviously useful too. Start this <u>memrise course for AS vocabulary</u>, OMITTING UNITS 1, 7, 8, 9. It is not the new spec for the A level, but the vocab here is a good start.

- 1) Visit the <u>dw.de</u> website and choose a podcast to listen too. I recommend Lang Sam gesprochene Nachrichten (slowly spoken news), but there are others available at various levels of German ability on a variety of topics (e.g. Jojo sucht sein Glück).
- 2) List at least twice a week during the holiday.
- 3) Use <u>languagesonline.org.uk</u> to revise all the verb tenses over the holiday.
- 4) Watch the films 'Goodbye Lenin' and 'das Leben der Anderen' with subtitles. You will be able to study one of these as part of your A level course and the choice will be yours (collectively).
