From the Executive Principal of CST

Dear Parents and Carers

It is a pleasure to be able to fill in for Mr Atkins for a few weeks.

The works to the school buildings which began over the summer holidays continue. However, the classrooms in the basement of the Rectory Building are complete and now in use. We are delighted with the finished result providing much needed bespoke Art and DT accommodation. The project efficiently reuses the space to gain two new large classrooms with additional storage. The new catering unit below Abbey House is also nearly complete and the new lunch and break time service will begin later this term.

Unfortunately the main build adjacent to Anchor Road had been delayed. The ruins of the ancient Augustinian Monastery dating from around 1140AD were discovered under the foundations. The archaeologists are enjoying the opportunity to discover more about the cellars and latrines but this does mean that the building may have to be redesigned. We are still hopeful that this project will be completed before September 2019.

It has been wonderful to welcome a new cohort of students in year seven and year twelve. There are now four hundred sixth form students on site and over 1000 students combined. We have, of course, welcomed many new staff this term who have quickly become an important part of our community. Co-curricular activities have begun in earnest and we are all very much looking forward to the musical Les Miserables which will be performed in February. The analysis of last year's GCSE and A-level results demonstrate significant value added and very high levels of attainment. BCCS continues to be one of the highest performing schools within the region. Many congratulations to all our students and staff. The school performance tables will be released by the DfE sometime before Christmas.

It has been a busy start of term and a lot of news accordingly. Please see details of recent events and events to come.

We now operate an online payment system called Parent Pay. This works in the same way WisePay did.



ParentPay enables the school to continue to be a cashless school and give parents the ability to pay by debit card for school meals, trips, and other items.

The Finance Office sent log in details and instructions for use over the summer for use. If you have not received your log on, please email finance@cathedralschoolstrust.org.uk.

When you log on to your child's account, you may find a list of charges available. I.e. lanyard, art portfolio etc. These may not be applicable to your child at hthis stage, please do not feel obliged to purchase these options unless your child needs them.

If you have more than one child, you can merge your children's account (i.e. then only requiring one log on).

This session provides parents with a window into the current popular technologies and how young people utilise them. Demonstrating the massive positives and potential pitfalls, the interactive presentation provides parents with advice, coping strategies and resources to help them understand and engage with their child's online lives. Rowing Challenge

In late June, BCCS was confirmed as an entrant to the Go Row Indoor Power8 Sprints School Challenge, and at very short notice we asked our students to take part on Sports Day. Set up by British Rowing to encourage as many people as possible to try Indoor Rowing, the Challenge took place across Bristol and the surrounding area, with 27 schools attempting to have the highest number of students row 350m on rowing machines.

Our students responded with great enthusiasm and 164 took part - many using a rowing machine for the first time. Some students even had 5 or 6 attempts and only stepped away from the machines if there was someone else waiting!

With 9 more rowers than any other school, BCCS won the Challenge, and Mr A Steward and Billy Steward (a member of the school Rowing Club) were presented with the trophy at the Power8 Sprints Regatta during the Harbour Festival by Max Gotrel, a Team GB Olympic Gold Medal winner.



Although the focus was on participation, notable mentions must go to Kathryn Burton and Evie Smith-Hayes, who both produced the best times (equal to a tenth of a second) by any girls in the school while in Year 8; Kean Biggs, who was the fastest Year 9 in the whole of the Challenge; and Lewis Antwis, the fastest Year 10 in the Challenge and the fastest student in school.

Pupil Premium

The government introduced 'Pupil Premium' funding to raise achievement in schools.

In brief, this funding supports students from disadvantaged backgrounds to ensure they benefit from the same opportunities as students from less disadvantaged backgrounds.

- → Young people in care
- Young people adopted from care,
- → Young people in receipt of free school meals
- → Those who have claimed free school meals in the past six years or whose parents are actively serving in the Armed Forces.

Careers at BCCS

There has never been a time when Careers Education has been as important for young people as it is today. The landscape of education, training and employment opportunities that students need to navigate is complex and challenging.

The BCCS Careers Programme is being designed to support our students be knowledgeable about career pathways and how to make best choices. At Bristol Cathedral Choir School we aim to get students thinking about Careers and Employability as soon as they arrive in Year 7. This is achieved via careers lessons, enterprise initiatives, employer challenges and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) projects.

We also provide information and support at times when students are required to make decisions about their future; in Year 9 when they choose their options, Year 11 when they make Post 16 choices and in Yr 12/13 for Post 18 decisions.

A vital part of Careers Guidance is Experience of Work (WEX). The formal WEX programme will run this academic year during 24th June and 5th July 2019. The programme will be launched to Year 11 students during an assembly this term and full details on the WEX process will be provided. WEX offers an amazing insight into the world of work and can support students to develop vital soft skills as well as influencing career choices. As such it is the expectation that all Year 11 students will take place in WEX.

WEX will also be available for Post 16 students however there will be flexibility on when students can complete a WEX placement. Full details of the WEX programme will be available on the school website soon.

GIASCO



Mind Full, or Mindful?

Mindfulness at BCCS

Have you ever driven your car somewhere and arrived at your destination only to realise you remember nothing about your journey? Or started eating a packet of chips and then suddenly noticed all you had left in your hands was an empty packet?

These are some common examples of 'mind/essness' – also known as being on 'autopilot'.

In this busy, hyper connected world we live in it's all too easy to lose ourselves in autopilot for much of the day....every day. Living this way we often fail to hear what our bodies are telling us and we all too often become stuck in ways of thinking and living that may be harmful to ourselves or others. We may also become vulnerable to anxiety, stress, depression and reactivity. Research shows, in fact, that the more our minds wander, the less happy we are (mrsmindfulness.com).

How can mindfulness help young people?

The benefits of mindfulness for adults has been well documented, but what about the benefits for young people? A new study in *Developmental Science* found an 8-week training programme improved emotion processing in 16-18-year-olds. In theory, this might reduce their vulnerability to depression (Sanger et al., 2018).

In another study, secondary school students who followed an in-class mindfulness programme reported reduced indications of depression, anxiety and stress up to six months later. Moreover, these students were less likely to develop pronounced depression-like symptoms (Raes, 2018).

What to know more?

Ms Hawthorn has trained with the Mindfulness in Schools Project (MiSP) who deliver high quality training in mindfulness for young people. She is running a mindfulness drop in every Monday and Wednesday lunchtime in M009 from 12:45-1:00. This is open to all students.

What is the Pupil Premium?



The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is additional funding that the government gives to schools for each pupil on roll where they are deemed to be disadvantaged. The money must be spent on that pupil to support their education, but it is for the school to determine how it is spent.

Why is the Government providing the Pupil Premium?

Poverty or low income is the single most important factor in predicting a child's future life chances, with many pupils having low attainment by the time they leave school at age 16. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium is the best way to address these underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

Who receives the Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is allocated to the pupils in school year groups from Reception to Year 11 from low income families who are registered for FSM, or who have been registered for FSM at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6'), together with children that have been in care continuously for 6 months or more.

What is the Service Premium?

The Service Premium grant is for pupils who have a parent serving in the armed services. Unlike the Pupil Premium, this grant is not solely for raising attainment for providing additional (mainly pastoral) support.

Who receives the Service Premium?

Pupils with a parent currently serving in the armed services and supporting their family, pupils who have a parent who died in action and those whose parents have left the service since April 2011 for other reasons, including injury. To be eligible, the parent must be supporting their family, so where they are separated or divorced a pupil will not be eligible. How do parents register their child's entitlement for Pupil Premium? Parents must apply for free school meals via the County Council or their child's school, this is a quick and simple process. Telephone 0845 155 1019 with your National Insurance Number, date of birth, name and child's details and an eligibility check can be carried out using the Department for Education's Eligibility Checking System, this will confirm if details have been matched or not. It will not tell us what benefits you are in receipt of, dates when a benefit was awarded or say how much you receive. Confirmation will be sent to you and school within 5-10 working days.

Pupils do not have to take up their entitlement to a free meal but Local Authorities and schools recommend that they do.

The government is make aware of each pupil claiming FSMs each term via the school census so they have up-to-date information on those eligible.

How much are the Pupil Premium Grants worth?

The Pupil Premium for the financial year 2018-19 is £935. This is significant additional money for schools to spend on supporting disadvantaged pupils and schools are very keen to ensure that all eligible pupils are 'signed up'. Grants are based on those pupils included in the January schools' census. Pupil Premium Plus for 2018-19 is £2,300. This is for pupils that are currently in care or have at some point been a child in care. Please contact Mr Callaghan if you seek further information regarding this.

How will schools spend the grant?

Schools must spend the grant for the educational benefit of their eligible pupils. The grant can be spent on services that benefit pupils at the school or their families, in the locality in which the school is situated. Pupil Premium grants can be carried forward to the next financial year if all the money is not spent in the year in which it is allocated.

What is the role of the local authority?

Local authorities are responsible for passing on the Pupil or Service Premium to maintained schools and for managing its distribution in respect of 'Looked After' children. The Education Funding Agency, not the local authority, allocates the grant to the Academy Schools but the eligibility criteria is exactly the same. However, neither organisation is responsible for how schools spend the Pupil Premium, except for pupils in care, where the Local Authority has responsibility for their wellbeing.

What obligations are placed on the school?

Schools will need to monitor the impact of their selected approaches to improve provision for pupils entitled to Pupil or Service Premium. The Pupil and Service Premium is not ring-fenced and schools are free to spend it as they wish to improve pupils' attainment.

How are parents informed about the use of the Pupil Premium grants?

The school's governing body must publish information on the school-website every year on the Pupil and Service Premium expenditure. For those parents that are not able to access the internet, a paper copy of this information can be provided. It should detail the funding received for the current academic year, as well as details of how it will be spent; there will also be details of how the previous academic year's allocation was spent.
